



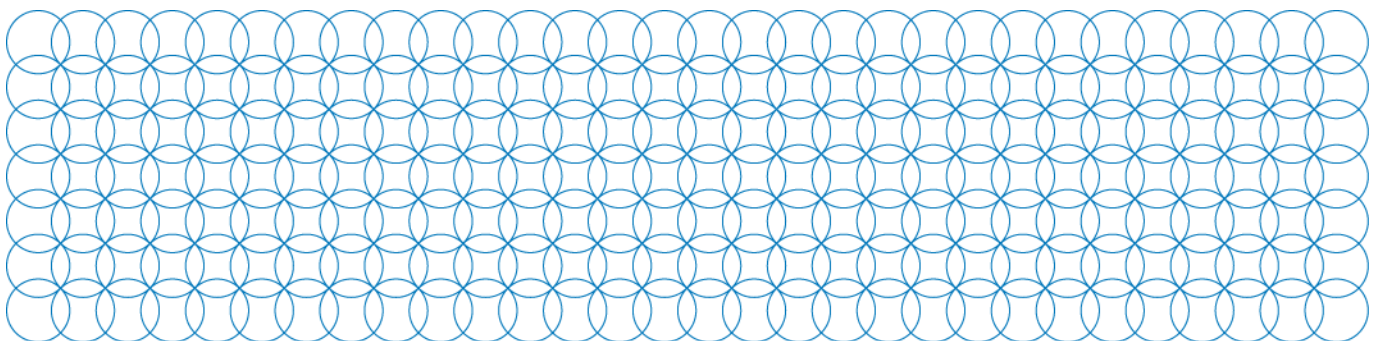

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## Foreword

In these very difficult economic times all of us have to realise we cannot continue as before. Everyone in the country has to play a part in addressing the economic situation and be prepared to make some sacrifice. In his recent Pre-Budget Report the Chancellor announced that an additional £360 million of efficiency savings would be realised in the Criminal Justice System by improving case management, putting underperforming or expensive public sector prisons out to competition during 2010-11, and reforming legal aid. In addition, the Prime Minister recently announced that the senior civil service pay bill will be cut by up to 20 per cent over the next three years to release savings of £100 million a year.

For legal aid, our aims are to ensure that it is prioritised effectively, and that we enable more people to resolve their civil legal problems, at an early stage.

Our proposals will help to sustain the legal aid budget further over the next spending review period and ensure that we focus criminal legal aid spending effectively. I want to ensure that we rebalance the legal aid budget as far as possible in favour of civil help for those who need it most. It is a very widespread view that the balance in legal aid spend is tilted far too far towards criminal legal aid at the expense of civil legal aid.

We value the work of Crown Court advocates, who play an important role in both prosecuting and defending in criminal trials. However, in light of our wider aims, one of the areas we decided to look at is the disparity between the payment mechanisms for prosecuting and defending advocates. The CPS has not reported any difficulty in obtaining advocates of sufficient quality as a result of the fee differential over the last two years. It is therefore difficult to justify spending more on defence advocates when the CPS is able to secure the services of advocates at lower rates.

Many people have long suggested that we need to do more to tackle the most expensive criminal cases. One way to achieve this is to reduce expenditure on Very High Cost Cases (VHCCs) which eats up a disproportionate amount of our limited resources. I recently asked the LSC to consult on proposals to increase the number of cases that are dealt with under the Graduated Fees Scheme (GFS), by moving cases due to last between 40 and 60 days at trial from the VHCC scheme to GFS. **This would produce additional savings that could allow me to make a substantially lesser reduction in the GFS which would be to the advantage of the vast majority of Crown Court advocates who rarely, if ever, appear in VHCC cases.**

## **Executive summary**

This consultation paper sets out proposals to bringing the rates paid to advocates for defence work more in line with the rates paid by the CPS. On average, barristers acting for the prosecution receive 17.9% less by way of remuneration than if they were acting for the defence. This disparity in rates means that defence advocates are more highly rewarded which in turn could be creating an incentive for barristers to favour defence over prosecution work.

We are aiming to save £47-48 m from advocates fees in order to contribute towards overall efficiency savings, and the Government's desire to prioritise civil legal aid expenditure during the current economic downturn so that it can continue to help as many people as possible with their civil law problems.

Two options are proposed:

- a one –off reduction of 17.9% in all advocates graduated fees, which would bring remuneration for defence advocates in line with rates payable to prosecution advocates by the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS); or
- a staged reduction over three years of 4.5% each year (a total reduction of 13.5%). This option would only achieve the required level of saving if the AGFS were extended to cover cases due to last up to 60 days at trial as set out in the Legal Services Commission's consultation paper "Very High Cost (Crime) Cases 2010" published on 2 December 2009.

## Introduction

1. This paper sets out for consultation proposals to ensure that criminal legal aid expenditure is effectively prioritised. The consultation is aimed at providers of publicly funded legal services in England and Wales and others with an interest in the justice system.
2. The consultation paper puts forward proposals to reduce the rates of remuneration for advocates in most Crown Court cases.
3. This consultation will last until 24 February which provides 10 weeks for those wishing to respond. Lord Bach, the Legal Aid Minister, believes this is sufficient given that we have already consulted on the principles behind this consultation in Legal Aid: Funding Reform (a consultation that ran from 20 August to 12 November 2009).
4. An initial Impact Assessment and an initial Equality Impact Assessment have been completed and indicate that practitioners are likely to be particularly affected. 5. Comments on the Impact Assessments are particularly welcome.

## Background

6. The advocacy graduated fee scheme (AGFS) was introduced in 1997 to remunerate the advocacy element for all cases that went to trial for 1-10 days. Since 1997 the scheme has been progressively extended to capture more cases. Since October 2005 all cases are covered by the scheme, apart from very high cost cases (VHCCs). VHCCs are currently cases that are expected to last more than 40 days at trial, though the Legal Services Commission is currently consulting<sup>1</sup> on a proposal to increase AGFS to cases due to last up to 60 days at trial.
7. The graduated fee scheme payment is calculated by applying a formula made up of a base fee (that varies with advocate type and offence type), uplifts for length of trial, a daily refresher (that varies with advocate type and offence type), uplifts for number of pages of prosecution evidence and number of prosecution witnesses, and some additional fixed payments
8. The graduated fee scheme provides certainty for both the purchaser and suppliers of advocacy services. Fees are fixed by a formula that is clear and understood by all, and payment is made promptly. The graduated fee scheme better rewards efficiency and encourage advocates to bring cases to a timely disposal.
9. As a result of the Government's acceptance of Lord Carter's recommendations following his review of Legal Aid Procurement<sup>2</sup> (in July 2006) a number of changes were made to AGFS and implemented in April 2007. Fees in the Crown Court under the AGFS were increased by 16% in 2007. The CPS did not mirror the Carter fee increases. As a result of the 2007 changes the CPS expenditure on advocacy is approximately 82% of the legal aid expenditure.

10. The key changes Lord Carter proposed were:

- enhanced base fees that include payment for the first two days of trial and incorporate the majority of ancillary payments that were previously paid as additional fees;
- uplifts limited to pages of prosecution evidence, numbers of prosecution witness and length of trial – length of trial uplifts only begin to be paid where the length of trial exceeds two days; and
- each case fee payable to a single trial advocate as identified at the outset of the case.

11. Lord Carter recommended that the then DCA and the Legal Services Commission should apply the ring fenced and capped budgets for Crown Court advocacy ancillary payments. If the budget was exceeded Lord Carter recommended the payments cease to be made as ancillary payments and are automatically absorbed without further negotiation into the base fee for all following years on a cost neutral basis.

12. Lord Carter’s new procurement scheme was designed as a short-term transition towards a single fee (for Crown Court litigation and advocacy) and price competition from 2009 onwards. He noted that the transitional scheme had a “measurable impact on income” which the then Chairman of the Bar Council put at an increase overall of 16%.

13. Another significant factor noted by Lord Carter was the emergence of a significant number of alternative business structures assuming the (then) Legal Services Bill was enacted. He felt this could provide an opportunity for businesses offering legal services to provide more efficient litigation and advocacy for certain areas of work.

14. The impact of the new rates had been assessed by Lord Carter against a basket of different Crown Court cases and showed that the changes to different elements within the revised graduated fee scheme would change the value of cases by between –3 to +20% – see table below. Most of the rebalancing had been directed towards the sorts of cases undertaken by more junior advocates.

15. Lord Carter’s assessment was based on a sample of actual case and payment records for advocates of different levels of experience who appear to work full time in publicly funded criminal defence work. Using these advocates’ caseload for 2005–06, estimated incomes, as shown in the table below, had been calculated using the revised graduated fee scheme. Overheads were assumed to be 35% based on a sample study in 2005 of 28 barristers across all years of call. The table showed that good quality and efficient advocates who were fully employed in publicly funded criminal defence work could expect appropriate remuneration for the work undertaken.

16. Lord Carter's review did not look at prosecution fees as those were outside his terms of reference. Both the Ministry and the Crown Prosecution Service have consistently told the Bar leadership, over the last 2.5 years, that there would be no increase in CPS rates<sup>3</sup>. The CPS fee scheme broadly matches the pre-Carter defence scheme structure and rates, although the CPS is keen to move to a similar structure to the AGFS, albeit on a cost-neutral basis. As the CPS use in house advocates for some advocacy work their scheme will continue to pay for some ancillary hearings separately so that there is the flexibility to use in house advocates for pre-trial hearings where appropriate.

17. Both the defence scheme (prior to 2007) and the CPS scheme covered most cases in the Crown Court, with fixed fees for appeals and committals for sentence and some other hearings. Payments are calculated by a formula based on the following key variables:

- the nature of the alleged offence;
- the type of case (for example, if there is a guilty plea or if the case goes to full trial);
- the length of trial;
- the number of pages of prosecution evidence;
- the number of prosecution witnesses; and
- the number of defendants.

## The Proposals

18. The proposals set out here are intended to better prioritise what we spend on criminal legal aid.
19. Our consultation Legal Aid: Funding Reforms (published on 20 August 2009) set out proposals to reduce fees in line with those paid by the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS). Our response to consultation (published on 16 December 2009) summarised the responses to consultation and set out our view that further consideration of a specific reduction in rates and a move towards parity with the prosecution was appropriate. We have considered carefully all the responses we received.
20. Over the last two and a half years CPS fees for prosecution counsel have been on average 17.9% less than the fees for their defence counterparts, although because the CPS scheme was not recalibrated in the same way as the defence scheme, the difference in fees varies from case to case.
21. In response to our earlier consultation most barristers agreed that parity between prosecution and defence was right in principle, though all argued that it could only be achieved by increasing prosecution rates. We believe that if parity is right in principle that the level that you pitch parity is not necessarily at the highest rate. The Government has to consider difficult choices in the current economic climate and has made a commitment to reduce the public sector pay bill.
22. The balance of work between prosecution and defence will vary on a case by case basis and the precise roles of prosecuting and defending advocates will be slightly different. However, in any criminal case the prosecution and defence advocates have a similar role and many tasks are common, such as reading the papers, preparing and presenting submissions, conferences and the examination and cross-examination of witnesses at court. On some occasions the balance will shift one way or another– eg to the prosecutor in a multi-handed case or the defence in the case of a vulnerable or reluctant defendant. Nevertheless, we believe that broadly speaking parity is appropriate overall on a swings and roundabouts basis.
23. We are seeking to make savings of £47-48m from advocates graduated fees
24. We are putting forward two options to reduce fees.

### *Option 1*

25. The first option is a simple one –off reduction of 17.9% in all advocates graduated fees, which would bring remuneration for defence advocates broadly in line with rates payable to prosecution advocates by the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) immediately. We would propose to apply the reduction across the board to keep it as simple as possible, ie every fee within the AGFS would be reduced by exactly 17.9%.

### *Option 2*

26. The second option is a staged reduction over three years of 4.5% in April each year (a total reduction of 13.5% by year three – April 2012). However, this option would only achieve the required level of saving if graduated fees for advocates were extended to cover cases due to last up to 60 days at

trial as set out in the Legal Services Commission's consultation paper "Very High Cost (Crime) Cases 2010" published on 2 December 2009. Currently cases due to last 40 to 60 days are generally taken under VHCC contract by the LSC. Moving those cases into the graduated fees schemes would, we estimate, save around 30% on the amount we would pay under VHCC contract. Therefore, we could factor that saving into the overall savings we are seeking to achieve.

27. There are benefits for advocates in moving more cases into AGFS, particularly for the most efficient who will do well under a system that pays for outputs rather than on an hourly rates basis (ie inputs). Such a scheme also provides certainty about fees for both the advocate and the LSC.
28. While this option is more attractive in some ways, as it allows us to move towards parity more gradually in a way that will not see an immediate significant drop, it does depend on the outcome of the VHCC consultation as we could only afford to go down this route if we decide to extend graduated fees to cases due to last up to 60 days. In arriving at a decision on this consultation we shall take into account the views expressed in response to the VHCC consultation.
29. As this option delivers less savings than option 1, we plan to consult early in the New Year on proposals to pilot a single graduated fee, as was originally recommended by Lord Carter. If we proceed to implement a single fee we anticipate that we might make some further savings that would help to make option 2 sustainable in the longer term.
30. The initial impact assessment sets out in more detail how each option would affect remuneration rates.

**Question 1: Given the current financial pressures, and the need to make savings, which of the two options above do you prefer?**

**Question 2: Are there alternative proposals you would suggest that would achieve the same level of savings in the same timeframe?**

## Costs and Benefits

31. As part of the consultation process we have undertaken an initial Impact Assessments and an initial Equality Impact Assessment on the proposals. These are set out at Annexes A and B.
32. The costs and benefits of the impact assessments have been assessed over time. The proposals would deliver a net present value of zero. This is based on the assessment that Government revenue savings will be directly offset by equal loss to private providers, with negligible administration costs.
33. Both the assessed proposals would lead to other impacts which are more difficult to value or may be highly uncertain and which are discussed in the impact assessments.
34. All of these proposals would, however, deliver significant benefits to the legal aid fund by reducing criminal legal aid expenditure. The Government believes this is essential given current financial pressures, the need to contribute towards overall efficiency savings, and the Government's desire to protect civil legal aid expenditure during the current economic downturn so that it can continue to help as many people as possible with their civil law problems.
35. We will review the analysis for all of the proposals during the consultation period and will also take account of information received from respondents to the consultation. We would welcome views and additional data relating to the impact assessments.

## **Next Steps**

36. The consultation will close on 24 February 2010. Following consultation, we intend to publish our response by March 2010.
37. If we proceed with the proposals in this consultation paper, the MoJ will make a Funding Order to implement these changes by April 2010.
38. We would usually enclose draft regulations/orders with the consultation. We have not done so in this case, but the regulations will not be complex and so we consider their inclusion with the consultation to be unnecessary.
